

LATINO COLLEGE COMPLETION: NEW JERSEY

For the U.S. to regain the top ranking in the world for college degree attainment, Latinos will need to earn 6.1 million more degrees by 2020.

FAST FACTS

STATE RANKING

New Jersey had the 7th largest Latino population in the U.S.¹

K-12 POPULATION

In New Jersey, 24% of the K-12 population was Latino.²

STATE POPULATION

In New Jersey, 20% of the state population was Latino.³ Projections show a continued increase.

MEDIAN AGE


The median age of Latinos in New Jersey was 31, compared to 45 for White non-Hispanics.⁴



DEGREE ATTAINMENT

In New Jersey, 24% of Latino adults (25 and older) had earned an associate degree or higher, compared to 44% of all adults.⁵

Latino Adults = 2.4 of 10



To reach the degree attainment goal by 2020, the U.S. can: I) close the equity gap in college completion; 2) increase the number of degrees conferred; and, 3) scale up programs and initiatives that work for Latino and other students. The following is a framework for tracking Latino degree attainment in New Jersey.

New Jersey Equity Gap in Degree Completion

Closing the equity gap in college completion can be tracked by the 3 measures provided below. Alone, none of these measures capture the entire "story" of equity in degree completion. However, in combination, they provide a useful picture of the equity gap in degree attainment between Latino and White cohorts in New Jersey in a single year (2014-15).

Graduation rates — Total graduation within 150% percent of program time for first-time, full-time freshman

Completions per 100 FTE students -

Total undergraduate degrees and certificates awarded per 100 full-time equivalent students (incorporates part-time students)

Completions Relative to the Population


in Need — Total undergraduate degrees and certificates awarded per 1,000 adults 25 years and older relative to the adult population with no college degree

DEGREE ATTAINMENT

Percentage of Latino adults in New Jersey (25 and older) with an associate degree or higher, compared to all adults in New Jersey.⁵

Latino Adults: 24%

All Adults: 44%



Examples of What Works for Latino Students

There are institutions that are showing success in enrolling, retaining, and graduating Latino students. The following are examples of institutional programs across the country with evidence of effectiveness in serving Latino students nominated for Examples of Excelencia.

Fairleigh Dickinson University's Puerta al Futuro, Gateway to the Future, enables Spanish-speaking adult immigrants to earn an AA or BA, with a track to an MA, while improving their English. Program allows for flexibility by providing evening and weekend classes, multiple sites, and online studies to meet the needs of the adults. The program

aims to prepare students with the credentials and tools needed to successfully integrate into U.S. culture and pursue the American Dream. In 2005, 22 students graduated through *Puerta*. *Puerta* graduates have enrolled in graduate programs at Rutgers, NYU, and FDU's highly- ranked Silberman College of Business.
